Our School

Bankhead Primary is a non-denominational, co-educational primary school situated in Knightswood, Glasgow. Our current school roll is 379 pupils ranging from P1-P7. The school is a one storey building constructed in 1930, and is therefore of traditional design. A new wing was opened in 1960, replacing part of the school damaged during the Second World War.

The school comprises of:

There are forms of dress that are unacceptable in school, such as items of clothing which:

- Potentially encourage factions (such as football colours)
- Could cause offence (such as anti-religious symbolism or political slogans)
- Could cause health and safety difficulties (such as loose-fitting clothing, jewellery)
- Could cause damage to flooring
- Carry advertising particularly for alcohol or tobacco
- Could be used to inflict damage on other pupils

The school sells attractive and hardwearing school sweatshirts, polo shirts, baseball caps and fleeces – these can be purchased by contacting the school office.

PE Kit

It is important that pupils come prepared to learn and for PE this requires appropriate clothing and footwear. All jewellery should be removed. Pupils who are not participating in PE must have a note or a medical certificate. Pupils who are unable to participate in practical PE should still bring their kit to allow them to assist in the lesson by refereeing,

keeping scores or assisting with the distribution of equipment. This ensures that they are still able to take part in some way in the work of the class and do not miss out on the knowledge and understanding of the course.




School Attendance

“Every child has the right to an education.”

Article 28 - United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child

At Bankhead Primary we believe that children should be included, engaged and involved in their education. Ensuring good school attendance and punctuality are crucial for the success of our learners. Unnecessary absence can have a detrimental impact on learning.



Whilst we promote good school attendance, we recognise that there may be times when absence is unavoidable, please read the section below to familiarise yourself with absence procedures.

Pupil Absence

Within Bankhead Primary School good attendance is encouraged at all times and children rewarded accordingly. Parents are asked to advise if their son or daughter is going to be absent. This should be done as early as possible on the first day of absence.

If the young person is going to be absent for some time, it would be helpful to know at the earliest opportunity.

The school uses daily text messaging to inform parents and carers of absence if no contact is made. All unexplained absences are investigated by the school and appropriate action taken.

All calls must be made to the Pupil Absence Reporting Line on **0141 287 0039** or **0141 471 3710**. The line is open between 08.00-15.30 Monday to Friday. Alternatively you can use the online form on the Glasgow City Council website:

- Sickness absence: if the absence lasts more than one day, parents and carers are required to call on subsequent days to provide an update. A letter should be provided to the school when the child returns from their absence.
- Medical or dental appointments: Parents and carers should call the team to report absences for medical or dental appointments. The school requires a letter or appointment card as evidence of the appointment to ensure permission is given to be absent from class.

To make sure you receive the right support you require, parents and carers should contact the school directly to report absences of a sensitive or personal nature, for example:

- Bereavement
- Serious illness, for example, an absence which is going to last more than one week
- Injury, for example, broken limb
- Contagious diseases or illness

The pupil absence service is provided by a dedicated team of experienced Education Support Staff. The information you provide to the team is updated in the school's system when you call, so the school is made aware of all absence information.

Medical appointments during school hours

If your child has an unavoidable appointment, please give them a letter for their class teacher and then collect them from the school office at the specified time.

Promoting Positive Behaviour

The highest standards of conduct are expected of pupils at all times. Our school uses a range of positive behaviour strategies to encourage pupils to aim high. Examples include:

- ✓ Certificates presented at assemblies each week.
- ✓ You'll Love to See it!
- ✓ Lighting Up Learning awards
- ✓ Kindness Award
- ✓ Monthly Pupil Recognition
- ✓ School House System



Certificate Winners

Developing good relationships and positive behaviour in the classroom, playground and wider community is essential for creating the right environment for effective learning and teaching. Where children and young people feel included, respected, safe and secure; and when their achievements and contributions are valued and celebrated, they are more likely to develop self-confidence, resilience and positive views about themselves. This includes taking restorative approaches to conflict resolution. These approaches are grounded in the understanding that individuals are responsible for their actions and when an action has caused harm, those involved have a responsibility to put things right.

Our older pupils are encouraged to set behaviour standards and help younger pupils at all times. P6 & P7 pupils help out in the dining room, playground and at wet intervals as playground pals, class buddies and table monitors. Our staff are all involved in developing strong Classroom Culture pedagogy, consistent routines are reinforced across the school and recognition boards are used to reinforce and recognise the positive actions and behaviours we expect of our children and staff, these are used in all classes.

Our three school values and rules provide guidelines for good behaviour for everyone in our school. The Pupil Councils, Circle Time and School/Class suggestion boxes encourage pupils to discuss a wide range of issues and find practical solutions to any problems. Anti- bullying week at the beginning of each session and anti-bullying leaflets for parents and pupils help everyone develop consistent anti-bullying strategies. P7 pupils are trained as peer mediators and work on a rota basis in our P4-7 playground helping pupils' resolve their playground disputes.

Bankhead Primary has recently begun its journey towards becoming an accredited 'Rights Respecting School.' Both adults and children work together to create safe, healthy and inspiring environments which place children's rights at the heart of learning. Children's Rights as outlined in the UNCRC (United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child) are fundamental to a good school ethos.

When a child is experiencing difficulty within school, staff will work closely with pupil, parents and if necessary outside agencies to find a solution which supports behaviour. Bankhead School has always enjoyed the support and co-operation of the parents in this matter, and confidently expects this to continue in the future.

Pupil Voice

Pupil voice is an essential vehicle for creating a positive learning climate. Within our school we promote pupil participation and active voice in a range of ways. We have an active Pupil Council, Rights Group, Learning Committee, Sports, ECO, Health and Wellbeing, Road Safety, House Captains and Vice Captains. This gives children the opportunity to promote 'pupil voice' in different ways, shape improvement and learn valuable skills for life and work.

Our Curriculum

Curriculum for Excellence has been introduced to raise standards of learning and teaching for all 3 to 18 year olds. It aims to help prepare children and young people with the knowledge and skills they need in a fast-changing world. As part of Curriculum for Excellence all children from pre-school to the end of S3 will receive a rounded education known as a Broad General Education(BGE). Curriculum for Excellence is all about bringing real life into the classroom and taking lessons beyond it. The inspiration and power of the arts play a vital role in enabling our children and young people to enhance their creative talent and develop their artistic skills. Children learn skills in Art, Craft, Drama, Movement, PE, Dance and Music. Children are encouraged to develop their own talents within these subjects.) The children share their learning through concerts, class and whole school assemblies and whole school shows.

Health and Wellbeing:

Learning in health and wellbeing ensures that children and young people develop the knowledge, understanding and skills which they need now and in the future to help them with their physical, emotional and social wellbeing. We are developing our Restorative Practice approaches to help children resolve their differences; we teach resilience skills

through our Emotions Work programme. P7 pupils each session take part in an exciting Peer Education Project on the dangers of drugs and alcohol over a period of 6 weeks culminating in a showcase event. All our pupils participate in Glasgow's Sexual Health and Relationships programme. Information about this programme is given to parents in advance and any parent who has a question about it should contact the Head Teacher. Each year our senior pupils are given the opportunity for a residential visit. Last year the children visited Blairvadach.

Science:

Science and its practical application in healthcare and industry is central to our economic future, for our health and wellbeing as individuals and as a society. Through learning in the sciences, children and young people develop their interest in, and understanding of, the living, material and physical world. In Bankhead Primary the children engage in a wide range of collaborative investigative tasks, which enables them to develop important skills to become creative, inventive and enterprising adults in a world where the skills and knowledge of the sciences are needed across all sectors of the economy.

Learning and teaching in science will take place across the main five science organisers.

- ✓ Knowledge and understanding of scientific ideas
- ✓ Principles and concepts of Planet Earth
- ✓ Forces, electricity and waves
- ✓ Biological systems
- ✓ Materials
- ✓ Topical science

Social Studies:

Through social studies, our children will develop their understanding of the world by learning about other people and places both past and present, societies, their beliefs and values.

As they mature our children's experiences will be broadened using Scottish, British, European and wider contexts for learning, while maintaining a focus on the historical, social, geographic, economic and political changes that have shaped Scotland. Our children will learn about human achievements and about how to make sense of changes in society, of conflicts and of environmental issues. With greater understanding comes the opportunity and ability to influence events by exercising informed and responsible citizenship.

The learning and teaching programmes focus on;

- ✓ People, past events and societies
- ✓ People, place and environment
- ✓ People in society, economy and business

Religious and Moral Education:

Religious and moral education includes learning about Christianity, Islam and other world religions, and supports the development of beliefs and values. Growing up in an increasingly diverse Scottish society our children are entitled to develop the knowledge and skills they need to navigate this multi-cultural, multi-faith country, confident that their own beliefs and moral values matter. A deepening awareness of others and of self will support our children to respond responsibly to issues of prejudice, discrimination and intolerance at local and national level. Learning in religious and moral education enables to understand and evaluate the consequences of different actions and attitudes.

Bankhead Primary aims to teach our children tolerance and respect for all faiths and culture and to value difference and diversity in our world. Our children visit local places of worship within the community and in Primary 7 we participate in joint learning opportunities with children and staff from Corpus Christi Primary.

Religious Observance:

Our school is fortunate to have a close link with the local church St. David's. The minister, Rev Graham Thain assists with the Christianity element of Religious and Moral Education and provides opportunities for religious observance. Parents have the right to withdraw their child from religious observance and should inform the school in writing.

In addition, parents and carers from religions other than Christianity may request that their children may be permitted to be absent from school in order to celebrate recognised religious events.

Only written requests detailing the proposed arrangements will be considered. Appropriate requests will be granted on up to 3 occasions in any 1 school session.

We aim to have eight Religious Observance events in school each year;
Christian- Harvest, Christmas, Easter,
Islam- Ramadan
Judaism- Purim and
Multi-faith/Non-faith- ECO, Anti-Bullying, Health Promoting

Languages:



Fun with phonics

Language and literacy are of personal and economic importance. The development of language skills is fundamental and central to pupils' learning. It is given high priority in the curriculum for excellence framework in both literacy and literacy across learning. All pupils must be equipped with knowledge and skills in language and an ability to use these with confidence.

In Bankhead Primary the emphasis is on the teaching of key skills, the integration of the different elements of language and the confident use of language in a wide variety of contexts that reflect all forms of modern communication. We will take every opportunity to teach specific skills and knowledge developing pupil's confidence in the context of all curricular areas. Pupils will experience a language rich environment.

Knowing other languages and understanding other cultures are a 21st century skill set for students as they prepare to live and work in a global society. French is taught to all pupils from Primary 1-Primary 7.

Mathematics:

Mathematics equips us with the skills we need to interpret and analyse information, simplify and solve problems, assess risk and make informed decisions. Mathematics is a means of communication requiring knowledge, skills and understanding. It is best seen as a problem solving activity supported by a body of knowledge which will help children understand the world about them and prepare them to act effectively in work, in recreation and in society in general.

Our aim is to provide our pupils with the skills required to work with problems and enquiries involving mathematics; and to teach the concepts, facts and techniques required to use and apply mathematics. We teach maths across the three aspects of;

- ✓ Number, money and measurement
- ✓ Information Handling
- ✓ Shape, Position and Movement

Technologies:

The range of subjects in technical education has changed significantly over the last two decades and now includes craft, design, engineering and graphics. Each class in Bankhead Primary has access to two computers, a Smart board, a digital projector, laptops, cameras, DVD recorders to encourage the development of computing skills. The school also has an up-to date Computer Suite which further enhances the children's learning. Children's learning is planned round the following organisers;

- Technology development in society
- ICT to enhance learning
- Business contexts
- Computing science contexts
- Food and textiles contexts
- Craft, design, engineering and graphics

There will be opportunities throughout the year for parents and carers to learn more about aspects of the curriculum and to be consulted about significant changes if appropriate.

Extra-Curricular Activities

We have a wide range of activities that run between Monday – Friday to extend the learning experience. These currently include table tennis, Karate, basketball, drama, football, multi-sports and football. All P1-P3 children participate in lunchtime clubs. Please check your child's schoolbag for information as places are popular and usually limited. In June 2018 Bankhead received a Sports Scotland Silver Award.

Good links with community organisations and our Active Schools Co-ordinator are vital for the success of these programmes.



Assessment & Reporting

All children are assessed both formally and informally throughout the year. This allows children and their teachers to identify their strengths and areas for improvement. A variety of assessment methods are used to enable staff to pass on information to parents about the progress of their child. Assessment records are kept by the class teacher and form the basis of discussion at Parents' Evenings in November and June. An annual report is discussed with parents at the last set of parents 'evenings.

Assessment is integrated at the planning process and measures the success of learning, children's understanding and informs next steps. In Bankhead Primary School class teachers use Formative Assessment in their day to day measurement of children's progress.

Formative Assessment focuses on:

- ✓ sharing the learning outcomes with the children
- ✓ children measuring how well they have learned by assessing their own
- ✓ work (self-assessment) and their classmates work (peer -assessment)
- ✓ teacher's providing feedback which includes next steps for learning.

Assessment by teachers and pupils is on-going throughout the year and to help with this process the children reflect on their learning on a weekly basis.

In addition to teacher devised assessments for specific areas of the curriculum we use standardised assessments in literacy and numeracy to further support our professional opinion of children's progress. From then, certain diagnostic tests in literacy and numeracy are used at regular stages in the child's development.

If you have any concerns regarding your child's progress please do not hesitate to contact the school at any point throughout the year.

Pupil Profiles

Every child leaving primary school in Scotland has their key achievements in school, at home and in the community documented within a P7 profile. The content of the profile is decided by the young person. The profile is a positive record of their achievements and emphasis their strengths. The profile provides a valuable way for learners to share valuable information about their achievements with their parents and teachers in secondary school.

Support for Pupils

The school has a duty to ensure that all pupils have equal access to the curriculum, with appropriate support for their needs if required. This applies to the content of lessons, teaching strategies and minor adaptations to the school environment.

There are a wide range of factors which may act as a barrier to learning. We are committed to working closely with parents and carers to ensure that they are fully involved in any decisions about support for their children's needs.

Any parent or carer seeking further advice regarding this policy should contact the Head teacher in the first instance. We will then develop support arrangements for the child, updating them regularly as the child's needs change throughout their time here at Bankhead.

- Our school maintains compliance with the **Education (additional Support for Learning) (Scotland) Act 2009** which includes –
 - (a) the authority's policy in relation to provision for additional support needs,

GCC Policy – Glasgow City Council has a duty, as outlined in the Standards in Scotland's Schools 2000 Act, to ensure that your child achieves their potential. Glasgow's Education Services is committed to the inclusion of all children and young people with additional support needs, where possible, within mainstream schools. This is in accordance with the statutory requirement in the

2000 Act. It is also part of Glasgow's policy to maintain a range of special educational establishments. This recognises the key role to be played by specialist provisions in addressing severe low incidence disabilities. The authority recognises that there are a wide range of factors, which may act as a barrier to your child's learning. We are committed to working closely with parents and carers to ensure that you are fully involved in overcoming barriers to learning. Additional support needs may be linked to a learning difficulty or disability but could also apply to a child or young person suffering from bereavement who requires pastoral support, a more able child/young person or those with a particular talent, which needs to be fully developed. The policy requires all establishments to provide an environment where children and young people with additional support needs are actively encouraged to be effective learners and benefit from their school education.

Nurturing City

The Glasgow City Council vision 'towards the nurturing city', puts building positive, trusting relationships at the core of our work. We ensure children, young people and families feel they belong, they are listened to and they are valued by embedding the principles of nurture across our early years, primary and secondary establishments. Staff are trained in attachment and nurture which deepens understanding of child development and enhances effective practice by responding to the needs of all children and young people in a consistent and caring way. Nurture is a universal approach which builds resilience, helping to reduce the impact of adversity. Effective communication and collaboration with parents and carers builds an ethos of partnership working putting the child at the centre, fostering high quality learning contexts.

Each of our nurturing establishments contribute to the development of Glasgow as a nurturing city, creating safe environments which allow our children and young people to flourish by raising attainment and promoting positive mental health and wellbeing.

GIRFEC and the Named Person

GIRFEC isn't an extra thing people have to do; it's a way for those who support children to work differently, making sure that they are all on the same page. Where needed, GIRFEC links day-to-day work in education, health, policing, social work and the voluntary sector – in fact any organisation whose staff come into direct contact with children. It makes it easier for those different organisations to communicate consistently with each other, and with parents, carers, children and young people.

GIRFEC provides a structure that helps people to work in the same way and use the same language. This allows discussions with the child and their family to focus on what is good in a child's life, and what might need attention or support.

It's the bedrock for all children's services and can also be used by practitioners in adult services who work with parents or carers.

The approach helps practitioners focus on what makes a positive difference for children and young people – and how they can act to deliver these improvements. Getting it right for every child is being threaded through all existing policy, practice, strategy and legislation affecting children, young people and their families.

What Getting it Right for Every Child means:

For children, young people and their families:

- They understand what is happening and why
- They have been listened to carefully and their wishes have been heard and understood
- They will feel confident about the help they are getting
- They are appropriately involved in discussions and decisions that affect them
- They can rely on appropriate help being available as soon as possible



They will have experienced a more streamlined and co-ordinated response from practitioners

For practitioners:

- Putting the child or young person at the centre and developing a shared understanding within and across agencies

Using common tools, language and processes, considering the child or young person as a whole, and promoting closer working where necessary with other practitioners


School Improvement



Transition (continued)

In May your child's teacher will visit your child in their Early Years Establishment. You and your child will be invited to attend two afternoons in May/June where your child will be introduced to their class teacher, their classmates and their P7 Buddy.

Parents will have an opportunity to meet with Senior Leadership Team and discuss any concerns or raise any questions. Early Years Staff will provide information about your child's learning to ensure there is a seamless transition from Early Years Education to Primary School.

Medical and Healthcare

The school nurse visits at various times during the year for routine health checks, vaccinations and medical examinations. Parents are kept informed by letter.

If a child becomes ill during the course of the school day, he/she may require to be sent home. Please ensure that you keep the school informed of all contact details.

Parents should inform the school of any medical requirements relating to their child. If a child requires medication during the school day, parents must complete the appropriate medical form. Emergencies

We make every effort to maintain a full educational service, but on some occasions circumstances arise which lead to disruption. Schools may be affected by, for example, severe weather, temporary interruption of transport, power failures or difficulties of fuel supply.

In such cases, we shall do all we can to let you know about the details of our closure or re-opening by using letters, texts and the local media etc.

School Meals
